



## Award of Jubilee Tourney "L.Togookhuu-75"

The Mongolian Chess Academy "KHOS MASTER" organized the International Chess Problems Tourney in 2022 to mark the 75th anniversary of chess composer **L.Togookhuu** on the theme "Removal of white pieces (pawns) from the black king" in orthodox h#3.

A total of 76 problems by 37 composers from 18 countries have been entered in the tourney. Problems were sent in an anonymized form to the tourney judge.

The awards of differences in the preliminary results remain unchanged.

They even stopped by our room to confirm or deny this!

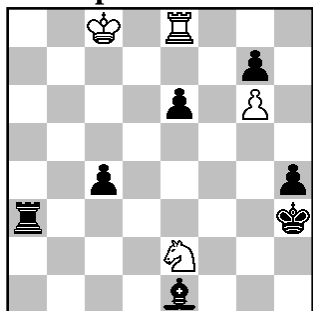
I wish Lkhundevin (our Togoo!) health and happiness.

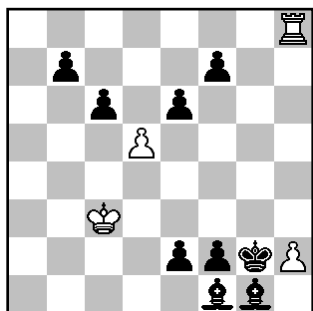

### **An overview of most problems...**

Several composers simply submitted problems from their archives, in which, on occasion, thematic moves were made away from the black king. It's fine if the content is "worthwhile".

In such cases, judging can be difficult! Do not divide into two sections!

Problems purposefully composed for TT (the desire for record content) and problems that have been deposited or returned from other tourneys. The difficulty of judging is to maintain balance!

A total of 76 problems were sent! of which 12 are miniatures. And if you take into account that one of them in 2 editions, to be chosen by the judge, then the exact coincidence is 75 on the jubilee 75!

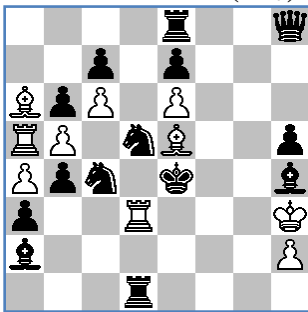
